Social Justice

"Social justice is both a process and a goal. The goal of social justice is full and Equitable participation of people from all social identity groups in a society that is mutually shaped to meet their needs. The **process** for obtaining the goal of social justice should also be Democratic and participatory, respectful of human diversity and group differences, and inclusive and affirming of human agency and capacity for working collaboratively with others to create change"






EXPLORING IDENTITY

I DID NOT INCLUDE RELIGION BECAUSE THE POWER STRUCTURE OF THIS CATEGORY VARIES TREMENDOUSLY FROM COUNTRY TO COUNTRY BUT IT SHOULD DEFINITELY BE INCLUDED IN THE CONVERSATION. (NOTE: I REALIZE THAT A SLIM BODY SIZE IS SEEN AS MORE ADVANTAGEOUS FOR WOMEN THAN FOR MEN). WHEELS LIKE THIS HELP US VISUALIZE WHAT THE TERM "MARGINALIZATION" MEANS: THE FURTHER YOU ARE FROM POWER, THE MORE MARGINALIZED AND POWERLESS YOU ARE. YOU WILL NOTICE AS YOU TRY TO PLACE YOURSELF IN THE DIFFERENT CATEGORIES THAT YOUR LEVEL OF POWER/MARGINALIZATION WILL LIKELY SHIFT BETWEEN CATEGORIES. THIS IS ANOTHER WAY TO LOOK AT INTERSECTIONALITY (COINED BY KIMBERLÉ CRENSHAW).



Privilege


Privilege is a term referencing aspects of one's identities that **hold power** in our society, regardless of whether those identities are **visible or invisible** at first sight.

What privileges have you seen in your previous courses?

Privilege means:

- There's a system at work
- Comes in more than one form (so can oppression)
- Folks can't access what privileges you experience, no matter how hard they work
- Having privilege refers to systemic benefits for your identity
- We all participate in discriminatory systems in different ways
- Pointing out privilege means supporting the marginalized group

There's a choice about what to do with privilege

Privilege DOESN'T mean:

- You're a bad person
- Haven't experienced oppression
- Didn't work hard or should feel bad about your good fortune
- Never been put down for your privileged identity
- Recognizing privilege doesn't mean to feel guilty
- Pointing out privilege doesn't mean hating those who have it


Having privilege doesn't mean there's nothing you can do about it






Intersectionality

Framework that refers to the ways in which our identities connect with each other and create specific experiences within overlapping systems of oppression

Why is it important to recognize intersectionality?



Intersectionality is a lens through which you can see where power comes and collides, where it locks and intersects. It is the acknowledgement that everyone has their own unique experiences of discrimination and privilege.

The Big Isms

Sexism

Prejudice, stereotyping, or discrimination, typically against women, on the basis of sex



Ableism

Discrimination against people with disabilities in favor of able-bodied people





Heterosexism

Discrimination or prejudice against homosexual individuals on the assumption that heterosexuality is the normal sexual orientation



Racism

Discrimination and oppression against people of color based on skin color and socially constructed racial hiearchy

The Big Isms

Gender Binarism

Classification of gender into two genders, men and women, by social constructs and cultural beliefs



Colonialism

Control over another country with economic exploitation





Ageism

Discrimination on an individual or group based on age



Classism

Classism is differential treatment based on social class/perceived social class; the systematic oppression of subordinated class groups to advantage and strengthen the dominant class groups.

Allyship

noun: An ally is someone who engages in action and solidarity with an individual or group in a marginalized community.



What not to do

The Savior Ally

- Someone who wants to "save" the community they're serving
- How to avoid being one:
 - remember that the forms of oppression are structural and need to be dismantled which involves more than one person
 - be aware of your identities and privileges
 - think critically about your engagement- are you "taking the mic" when you should be passing it?



The Mactavist

- or performative activist
- Someone who uses the community for their own benefit.
- How to avoid being one:
 - be critical of what you post online (good tip in general)
 - are you sharing resources and education for true allyship purposes, or posting so you look good?
 - engage critical in all aspects of your life- with friends, family, and classmates



The Single Issues Ally

- Someone who focuses on one aspect of an issue without taking all factors into account
- Remember-
 - all forms of oppressions are interlinked,
 therefore our liberation is linked as well
- How to avoid being one:
 - Think intersectionally
 - Act intentionally



Listen

Listening to target group(s) you are attempting to be in solidarity with

Educate

Take the time to educate yourself

Be Consistent

Remember that being an ally is a continuous and active process

Take Accountability

Keep yourself accountable, always...

Speak up

Speak up using your education and privilege without taking credit or speaking over the voices of marginalized groups


How to be an Ally

Ways to be inclusive:

With WORDS

- Using inclusive/gender-neutral language
- Using correct pronouns
- Including pronouns in your Zoom name, if you are safe and able
- Closed captioning and alt text
- Keep in mind visual impairments and colorblindness, especially for digital materials!
- Account for differing learning and communication styles
- Engage with and share resources made by/for underrepresented





Ways to be inclusive:



With ACTIONS

• Limit use of fragrances like perfume/cologne, especially in crowded places



CHECK:

- Is your space accessible for wheel-chair users?
- Do you have alternate seating options/different kinds of chairs?
- Does the room have flashing or flickering lights?
 - Try to avoid using rooms with fluorescent lighting when possible!
- Can people of all abilities participate in your activities?
- LISTEN -- Make sure people's voices are being heard and taken seriously!






