What we know so far

Pause on Visa Appointments

- In late May, the U.S. Department of State ordered U.S. Embassies and consular sections paused the scheduling of any new F, M, and J visa appointments
- As of June 18, 2025 visa interviews have resumed, but with "enhanced" vetting measures in place
- Applicants are now required to adjust privacy settings on their social media accounts to "public" as part of vetting process
- Appointment availability will vary by location and slots may fill quickly. Monitor visa appointment availability frequently.
- ISEO now processing I-20 (F-1) and DS-2019 (J-1) documents within regular processing time

What we know so far

Travel Restrictions

- On June 4, 2025, travel bans were issued via Presidential Proclamation, which went into effect on June 9, 2025
- **Full entry restrictions**: Afghanistan, Burma (Myanmar), Chad, Republic of the Congo, Equatorial Guinea, Eritrea, Haiti, Iran, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Yemen
- Partial restrictions (suspension of B1/B2, F, M, and visas): Burundi, Cuba, Laos,
 Sierra Leone, Togo, Turkmenistan, Venezuela
- Certain exceptions granted
- ISEO monitoring carefully for additional travel ban announcements

The role of visas in eligibility for...

Entering the Country

• A valid visa stamp is required. This is your "ticket" for entry. Can expire in U.S. without affecting F-1 or J-1 **status**.

Remaining in the Country

• Must maintain F-1 or J-1 **status**. This is determined by U.S. entry record (I-94), valid I-20 or DS-2019, and adherence to rules and regulations (full time enrollment, employment with valid authorization, etc.). <u>Not</u> determined by visa stamp.

Employment

- International students must physically be present in the U.S. in valid F-1 status to be eligible for employment, including as a Graduate Student Researcher or a Teaching Assistant.
- This employment might be the source of both a salary and payment of tuition and fees.
- Students who are not physically in the U.S. will need to consider other sources of funding, such as personal funding, if remote enrollment is an option.



Fall Enrollment Options

Decisions about academic continuity will be made by your program. You can ask about:

Deferring your Admission

- If you would like to request to defer your admission to a future quarter, reach out to your academic program directly with your request. Deferral approval is not guaranteed.
- You may request to defer for up to 1 academic year. i.e., Fall 2025 → Fall 2026. You may also request a deferral for one quarter (i.e., to start in the Winter quarter).
- Planning ahead is best. Please communicate with your program about deferral options, including the deadline. Deferrals cannot be made after classes start during the quarter you were originally admitted to. However, your program will likely have its own (earlier) internal deadline.

The Potential for Remote Course Offerings

• Remote options are at the discretion of instructors, departments, and the faculty's Academic Senate. Remote coursework may have an impact on future employment options. We hope to have more information available soon.
