- Log into your Applicant Portal (connect.grad.ucsd.edu/apply):
 - Accept your offer of admission
 - Be sure to fill out the Statement of Legal
 Residence form if it is listed. This form is not required for all programs if it is not listed, there is no action for you to take on this.
 - Most students are "provisionally admitted" at this time. Please submit the items listed under your "Pending Admissions Documents" section in your portal to finalize your admission.
- Please contact <u>GradAdmissions@ucsd.edu</u> if you have questions regarding your pending admissions documents.

Undergraduate Students



- Log into your Applicant Portal (<u>beatriton.ucsd.edu/account</u>) and complete your Enrollment Checklist:
 - Accept your offer of admission
 - Complete the <u>California Residency for Tuition</u>
 <u>Purposes Questionnaire</u> (if required)
- 2-3 days later, you will receive an email asking you to create your TritonLink Active Directory and Duo accounts.
 - Creation of your Active Directory will provide you with your UC San Diego PID and email.

CONGRATULATIONS! Newly Admitted **Bachelor's, Master's, and PhD International Students**: The International Services and Engagement Office (ISEO) congratulates you on your admission to the University of California, San Diego!

This page provides a comprehensive guide for newly admitted international undergraduate and graduate students on obtaining their U.S. student visa (F-1 or J-1) and preparing for their arrival to the United States.

Summer Session Visiting Student: if you will only be enrolling with UC San Diego for Summer Session and will **not** matriculate into a UC San Diego degree program, please visit <u>ISEO's New Summer Session Visiting Page</u>.

Step 1: Apply for F-1 or J-1 Certificate of Eligibility

To apply for an F-1 or J-1 visa stamp at a U.S. consulate/embassy, OR to transfer your SEVIS record to UC San Diego (if applicable), you must request that ISEO issue you the appropriate visa status certificate of eligibility document, called the Form I-20 (for F-1 students) or the Form DS-2019 (for J-1 students).



The UC San Diego Police Department works with our campus partners to create a safe campus for our community members and visitors.

I'm going to share some important information so you can stay safe.


UC San Diego Police

- UCPD was founded in 1960; currently:
 - 275 officers systemwide
 - 50 officers here
- Officers interact closely with students and the surrounding La Jolla community.
- Being part of the campus community helps build and maintain trust and positive working relationships.
- Officers interact closely with students through various programs such as Residence Hall Liaisons, Greek Liaisons and engagement events, like Coffee with a Cop and pizza nights.

University Safety Officials

We partner with Housing*Dining*Hospitality to offer the University Safety Official Program.

- USOs complete training, including cultural diversity and inclusion, conflict resolution, crisis intervention and mental health support.
- USOs get to know residents and become involved with the community that they serve.
- Two USOs are assigned to residential areas of each college from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. daily.



Community Service Officials

We employ UC San Diego students as Community Service Officials who provide many safety-related services.

- Earn \$17.55-\$19.85 per hour.
- Flexible schedules won't conflict with your classes.
- Work 10–19 hours per week, mostly evenings.

- Loud Music (415PC)

- Resisting Arrest (148 PC)
- Furnishing Alcohol to Minor (25658 B&P)
- Vandalism (594 PC)
- Urinating in Public (56.55 SDMC)
- Minor Transporting Alcohol (23224 VC)

False Information Regarding Identity

- Possession of fake ID
- Being dishonest about your identity
- Having ID showing you to be 21 or older
- Note: Possession of a fake ID is enough to be charged.

Furnishing Alcohol to a Minor

- Every person who sells, furnishes, gives, or causes to be sold, furnished, or given away any alcoholic beverage to any person under 21 years of age is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- Up to \$3,000 fine
- Know who is at your party.
 - Can happen in residence halls
 - Can happen even if you are under 21

Open Container of Alcohol

- A can, bottle or other receptacle containing an alcoholic beverage that is opened, has a broken seal or the contents have been partially removed is considered an open container.
- California law prohibits open containers in any public place, park or recreation area owned by cities or counties in California.





Public Intoxication

- Being drunk in public (or public intoxication) is a misdemeanor in California.
- A public intoxication conviction will go on you permanent criminal record.

What to Do If...

Police Stop You

- Don't run.
- Don't argue.
- Don't touch.
- Don't resist.
- Tell the truth; don't lie.
- Stay calm and go with the flow.

You Go to Court

- Dress professionally.
- Be prepared.
- Have something to say.

Property Theft | Protect Your Stuff

- Engrave anything valuable with your driver's license number: Phones, computers, laptops, iPods and (use tracking software
- Secure valuables: Cable with lock.
- Lock doors/windows: res halls, apartments, vehicles.
- Keep copies at home: Serial numbers, credit/debit card numbers, etc.
- Keep personal information locked up!



PD Tips

- No loud music after hours.
- Stay with your friends or group.
- Fly under the radar; don't draw attention to yourself.
- If you are going to drink, get your own drink.
- Know your limits; have a drink cut off.
- Be disciplined! (Beware of sharks!)

Scams, Phishing and Identity Theft

Extortion Scams

- Students are often the target of extortion scams.
- Largest UC San Diego student loss in 2020:

Common Scams and Warning Signs

- Sales
- Kings, Queens, Princes
- Credit card fraud
- Threats of arrest
 ① U.S. Marshalls / Chinese Consulate / Police
- Threats of withholding diploma
- Threats to your Visa
- Offer to pay tuition
- Third-party payments
- Unfamiliar emails or text messages with a link

Signs of a scam:

Pre-paid card
Apple Pay
"Click here" or
"Click on this link"

Government Agency Scams

Includes any government agency: IRS, Social Security, DMV, etc.

NOTE:

- The U.S. government does not accept gift cards or bitcoin.
- Official correspondence from the U.S. government will be in the form of a letter and/or an official government agent or employee meeting with you in person.
- The U.S. government will never ask you for money over the phone.

Anyone can be Anyone on the Internet

Criminals will try to extort you for money.

Take these precautions to stay safe:

- Do not share your personal information.
- Do not send nude photos of yourself.
- Do not meet with anyone that you do not know personally.
- Do not send money to anyone that you have not met or do not know personally.



Identity Theft

Clues that someone has stolen your identity:

- You discover unexpected withdrawals from your bank account.
- You stop getting your bills or other mail.
- Merchants refuse your cards/ checks.
- Debt collectors call you about debts that are not yours.
- You find unfamiliar accounts on your credit report.
- The IRS notifies you that more than one tax return was filed.

Ways to Protect Yourself

- Contact your consulate.
- Monitor your financial statements.
- Check your credit reports regularly. If your card is compromised, place a fraud alert on your credit reports.
- Open new American credit card and financial accounts.
- Shred your documents.

- Strengthen your passwords.
- Guard your Social Security Number, passport/Visa ID number.
- Use social media wisely.
- Secure your phone.
- Know the signs of phishing and email scams.
- Keep your mail safe.

If You are the Victim of a Crime...

- 1 Lockdown the compromised account.
- 2 Enroll in credit monitoring service, if offered.
- 3 Review bank/credit card statement for unauthorized charges.
- 4 Review credit reports for unauthorized accounts.
- File a report with the Federal Trade Commission:
 - FTCComplaintAssistant.gov | 1-877-ID-THEFT (1-877-438-4338)
- File a report with your local police department.







A Few Considerations!

- Scams
- Insurance
- Off Campus Housing



COMMON SCAMS:

- Usually involve asking you to **deposit a fake check** and for you to make a real electronic money transfer.
- Most every phone call/email from "social security", IRS, Homeland Security/ICE/ Customs, etc. is fake; **THE GOVERNMENT WILL NOT CALL YOU!** (Call SLS if You aren't sure!)
- RENTING (INCLUDING OFFCAMPUSHOUSING.UCSD.EDU)
- JOBS (INCLUDING HANDSHAKE/UC SAN DIEGO)
- FAKE MERCHANDISE
- PREPAID CARDS = SCAM
- DO NOT SEND MONEY UNTIL/UNLESS YOU HAVE THE KEYS/MERCHANDISE/CONTRACT/ETC.!

INSURANCE:

MEDICAL/DENTAL INSURANCE: (NOT A SCAM, BUT) WHAT A DOCTOR/NURSE SAYS MAY NOT BE WHAT YOUR MEDICAL/DENTAL INSURANCE COVERS. EXAMPLE: INVISALIGN/COSMETIC DENTAL WORK.

GET GOOD RENTER'S INSURANCE (CAN INCLUDE PERSONAL PROPERTY (LOSS/THEFT/DAMAGE), LIABILITY, FLOOD, MOLD/MILDEW, "LOSS OF USE")

GET GOOD AUTOMOBILE INSURANCE (WHETHER YOU OWN/REGULARLY DRIVE A CAR OR USE ONE FOR A VACATION.) "LIABILITY INSURANCE" IS NOT ENOUGH!

CHECK OUT THE SLS "INTRODUCTION TO CALIFORNIA AND U.S. LAW" FOR MORE ABOUT INSURANCE AND OTHER ISSUES (DRIVING/BUYING A CAR, RENTING, ETC.)!

OFF-CAMPUS HOUSING TIPS:

- All tenants/roommates are "jointly and severally liable"! (as are co-signers/guarantors) consider using a roommate agreement! (see sls.ucsd.edu -> "sample forms and agreements.")
- PROTECT YOUR SECURITY DEPOSIT!!
 - Take lots of **Photos** (at move in and move out)
 - COMPLETE AN INSPECTION CHECKLIST (ALSO AT SLS.UCSD.EDU)
 - GIVE AT LEAST **30 DAYS PRIOR WRITTEN NOTICE** BEFORE LEASE END
 - REQUEST AND COMPLETE AN "INITIAL" (I.E., PRE-MOVE OUT) INSPECTION
 - Put repair requests and other communications with landlord in writing!
- CONTACT STUDENT LEGAL SERVICES FOR LEASE REVIEW/QUESTIONS!



CARE at the Sexual Assault Resource Center (CARE at SARC)



About CARE at SARC



- Free and confidential
- Available to all students, staff and faculty on campus
- Survivor-centered, empowermentbased, trauma-informed
- Addresses sexual assault, relationship violence and stalking

Confidentiality

CARE staff are Certified Sexual Assault/Domestic Violence Counselors.

One-on-one conversations between clients and CARE staff are confidential under CA Law.

CARE staff are only mandated to report:

- Child abuse
- Elder abuse
- Harm to self
- Harm to others

Survivor Support Services

24/7 Support

Support available after hours, during holidays, and on weekends.

Options & Rights

Assistance in reviewing reporting options and rights; accompaniment to investigative meetings, forensic exams, and court.

Case Management

Safety planning; support with academics, housing, employment; resource referrals.

Holistic Healing Programs

Groups and drop-in programs focused on trauma recovery and peer support.



Prevention Education and Training

Mandatory Education

For all incoming undergraduate students delivered online and inperson at Orientation.

Outreach & Awareness



Staying Safe Online

Consider when and what you share

- Be mindful of the info you share, including:
 - Where you live
 - Where you work
 - Geotagging and sharing current location

Use privacy setting features

- Consider the following:
 - Who can view your page
 - Who can request or massage you
 - Settings that share location info
 - How tagged content appears on your page

Report repeated and unwanted encounters

- Review app policies on community engagement and behavior
- Report unwanted and unfamiliar encounters to the app facilitator

Alert authorities of persistent activity

- File a report with law enforcement if persistent attempts to contact you have been made
- CARE at SARC can connect you with other resources and provide confidential advocacy and support services

*Safety strategies can be employed to help you feel more secure, but it is never the victim/survivor's fault if violence occurs. If you have questions or need support, reach out to CARE for support at careadvocate@ucsd.edu.





How to Avoid Housing & Tuition Scams

Only Pay Through Official UC San Diego Channels

- Use TritonPay (https://tritonpay.ucsd.edu) to view and pay your university bill.
- UC San Diego never asks for payment through gift cards, Venmo, Zelle, or cryptocurrency.

Never Share Your Login or Account Credentials

- Your UCSD login (Single Sign-On) and TritonPay account are private. Never share your password—even with family or friends.
- If someone else (like a parent or family member) needs to view or pay your bill, set them up as an Authorized Payer through TritonPay. It's safe and secure.

Be Cautious of Fake Emails or Phone Calls

- Scammers often pose as UC San Diego staff, law enforcement, or immigration officers.
- Red flags: demands for immediate payment, threats of arrest or deportation, or unusual payment methods.

Check Your Student Account Often

- Use TritonLink to review your charges and payments regularly.
- If you see something that doesn't look right, reach out to our office right away.

How to Avoid Housing & Tuition Scams

Don't Fall for "Discounted Tuition" Offers

• Scammers may offer to pay your tuition at a discount if you send them a smaller amount first. This is a scam.

Protect Your Campus ID Card and Info

- Don't share your Campus ID number or let anyone else use your physical card.
- Watch for phishing emails pretending to be from the Campus Card Office. Don't click on suspicious links.
- Always check that messages come from @ucsd.edu and visit official sites directly.
- If you have lost your card, DEACTIVATE IT IMMEDIATELY at the Triton eAccounts Portal, by visiting: https://hdhtcas.ucsd.edu/.

Know the Signs of a Scam

- Pressure to act urgently
- Threats of deportation or academic consequences
- Unusual payment methods
- Poor grammar or unofficial sender addresses



U.S. Law

- U.S. laws may differ from the ones you are used to back home
- Federal law vs state law
 - Federal law: Must be 21 to buy and consume alcohol
 - State law: possession and use of marijuana may be legal in the state of California, it is not legal under federal law
- If you are charged with a DUI or crime, it could have a major impact on your ability to remain in the U.S. as a student.

Possible Effects of Arrests on Visa Status

- Visa Revocation
- Minor and Major Offenses
- Unnecessary Stress
- Lasting Impact

If you receive a suspicious call from someone demanding that you provide personal information or pay a large fine – **you may be the target of a scam**

Tips to help you identify a scam:

- Typically begins with a phone call and the caller identifies themselves as someone from an official agency (e.g. Police Officer, Immigration Employee, Social Security Administration Employee, FBI Agent, etc.)
- Caller threatens you and asks for personal information
- Caller asks for some sort of payment (e.g. wire money, purchase gift cards, etc.)

REMEMBER

These official agencies will NEVER ask for money or personal/financial information by phone (call or text)

You should

- NEVER provide personal information
- NEVER provide financial information such as bank account numbers, routing information, account balances
- NEVER send/wire any money

If you receive a suspicious call, take the following steps:

- Ask the name of the caller and name of the agency they claim to represent
- Hang up
- Look up the number online as well as the official number of the agency that supposedly contacted you
- Confirm with the official agency that they called you


- If you cannot verify the caller's identity, feel unsafe, or suspect criminal activity, call the UC San Diego Police Department: Non-emergency help line: (858) 534-4357
- Report immigration scams to US Citizenship & Immigration Services (USCIS) by completing the online form at the <u>USCIS Avoid Scams website</u>.
- Report the scam to the <u>Federal Trade Commission</u>.


