If detained by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE):

- Immigration officers can require nonimmigrants to provide evidence related to their immigration status. However, you have the right to remain silent if your answer to a question could be used against you in a criminal case.
- You have the right to a lawyer, but the government does not have to provide one for you. If you do not have a lawyer, ask for a list of free or low-cost legal services.
- You have the right to contact your consulate or have an officer inform the consulate of your detention.
- Do not sign anything, such as a voluntary departure or stipulated removal, without talking to a lawyer. If you sign the document, you may be giving up your opportunity to try to stay in the U.S.
- · Keep a copy of your immigration documents with someone you trust.

If arrested by police:

- You have the right to remain silent. If you wish to exercise that right, say so out loud.
- You have the right to refuse to consent to a search of yourself, your car, or your home.
- If you are not under arrest, you have the right to calmly leave.
- · You have the right to a lawyer if you are arrested. Ask for one immediately.
- Regardless of your immigration or citizenship status, you have constitutional rights.
